Topaz of any type is a good jewellery stone and it is historically one of the most important gemstones. With its relatively high refractive index and hardness of eight (Mohs scale), with no special sensitivity to chemicals it can be used, with appropriate care (should be protected from hard knocks), in any jewellery application.

Topaz comes in many collars, including clear, brown, yellow, orange, red, pink and blue. The blue topaz, with a pale to medium blue colour created by irradiation, can be found in very large sizes at affordable prices. The fine golden-yellow variety, known as Imperial Topaz, is relatively scarce. Topaz colours are rarely vivid. The most common colour is yellow with a red tint; the most valuable is pink to reddish. The colouring agents are iron and chromium.

The name topaz is most probably derived from an island in the Red Sea, "Topazos", today called Zabargad, the ancient source of peridot. In former times all golden-brown and sometimes also green gemstones were called topaz, which caused sufficient confusion such that today real topaz is referred to as precious topaz.

Feature Article: Lightning Ridge Trip by Suzy Brandstater

Seven club members made the trek to Lightning Ridge.

Our first stop was for two days at Grawin where we stayed at the Glengarry Hilton. It was a great place to stay, our accommodation was in 'Dongas' although you could camp if you wanted to. The Glengarry Hilton has long drop toilets and showers. The only hitch with the showers is that they are BYO water. The food was great and the locals were very entertaining. We met some of the famous local characters such as Smurf. They had interesting stories to tell about living and working on the Glengarry Opal fields.

We fossicked on the mullock heaps and alongside the road. We found a few stones but not a lot. The regular fossickers beside us were not having much luck either. But I now have a fantastic collection of potch.

After two fun filled days of fossicking at the Grawin we travelled to Lightning Ridge. We tried the new caravan park. 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straight out of the 70s. It has an extensive collection of rocks and minerals and historical memorabilia. Following an advertisement in a Liverpool newspaper, 22 people turned up to a meeting held on February 21st 1966 to form a lapidary club.

The club was to be known as Macquarie Fields & Districts Lapidary club and all 22 people joined.

Doreen Aiton was elected as President, Sylvia Martyn as Secretary and Jim Tully as the Treasurer. Eric Dory who was a jeweller in Campbelltown, was elected as the patron. Eric made the Campbelltown Mayoral collar and Harry Baker cut the cabochons for it. This collar was later stolen and never recovered.
