Field Trip



We will be spending a few days at the Ridge, visiting a mine, fossicking and going to the Chamber of The Black Hand underground sculpture gallery. No evening at the Ridge is complete without a long soak in the hot springs. The bore bath is open 24/7 and is free.

On the Friday we will travel to the Grawin. I have booked accommodation at the Glengarry Hilton, but camping is also available there.

We will be fossicking on the big dumps (pictured below) and hopefully coming home with a lovely opal. We will leave Grawin on Sunday for the long trip home.





Lapis Lazuli

While sapphire is the birthstone for September, Lapis Lazuli is an alternate Birthstone. It is also blue and is the stone for Libra which is partially in September.

In ancient times, pharaohs and kings wore a lapis lazuli stone as amulet. The eyes and eyebrows of these rulers' funeral images were inlaid with lapis lazuli. The golden sarcophagus of King Tutankhamen was richly inlaid with Lapis, as were other burial ornaments of Egyptian kings and queens. It was used extensively in scarabs, pendants and other jewellery, Cleopatra herself was said to have worn powdered lapis lazuli for her eye shadow.

Lapis lazuli is not a mineral, but a rock, produced from an aggregation of different minerals. Lazurite forms the bulk of a lapis lazuli rock, and is the cause of the gemstone's deep blue colour. Another mineral component of a lapis lazuli is another gemstone called sodalite. Pyrite, better known as fool's gold, makes the speckles of yellow on a lapis lazuli stone and the white intrusions are calcite. The word azure is derived from the name lapis lazuli, and denotes a deep blue colour as of the lapis lazuli gem. A poorer quality Lapis is lighter blue with more white than gold flecks, and is sometimes called denim Lapis.

PHYSICAL CHARACTERISTICS:

- Colour is brilliant blue with violet or greenish tints.
- Lustre is dull to greasy.
- Transparency: Crystals are translucent to opaque.
- Crystal System: Isometric;
- Crystal Habits: Dodecahedral crystals have been found, usually massive as a rock (lapis lazuli) forming mineral.
- Cleavage is poor, in six directions, but rarely seen.
- Fracture is uneven
- Hardness is 5 5.5
- Specific Gravity is 2.3 2.4
- Streak is bright blue.
- Index of refraction is 1.5.
- Associated Minerals are calcite, some pyroxenes and most diagnostic pyrite.
- Notable Occurrences include Kokcha River valley, Afghanistan; Ovalle, Cordillera, Chile; near Lake Baikal, Russia; Mt. Vesuvius, Italy; Cascade Canyon, San Bernardino Mountains and Ontario Peak, California and in the Sawatch Mountains, Colorado, USA.
- Best Field Indicators are the violet-blue colour, pyrite association (unlike sodalite), locality and specific gravity.

Lapis lazuli has been mined for centuries in the remote mountain valley called Kokcha, Afghanistan. First mined 6000 years ago, the rock was transported to Egypt and present day Iraq and later to Europe where it was used in jewellery and for ornamental stone. Europeans ground down the rock into an expensive powdered pigment for paints called "ultramarine". Today ultramarine is manufactured artificially. Although no longer the only source of lapis, Afghanistan still produces the finest quality material.

Spiritual Meaning

Lapis is an excellent stone for executives, journalists, and psychologists, stimulating wisdom and good judgment in the practical world. It aids intellectual analysis in archaeologists and historians, problem solving for lawyers, and creates new ideas for inventors and writers.

It is considered to be a stone of truth, Lapis is said to encourage honesty of the spirit, and in the spoken and written word. It can be worn for all forms of deep communication. It is also a stone of friendship and brings harmony in relationships. A Lapis grid is said to bring calm and loving communication for a home with temperamental teenagers, or children with Asperger's syndrome, autism, or attention-deficit disorder
