July Workshop - 24/7/15 **Jewellery Basics 102**

At our last jewellery basics workshop we learnt how to insert a bead into a chain and how to attach a bead to a pendant.

Carnelian

Ruby is the traditional birthstone for July. Carnelian is the Arabic birthstone and also an alternative British birthstone for July.

Carnelian is the red, orange, or amber variety of Chalcedony which is a member of the quartz group of minerals. Quartz crystals are made up from silicon dioxide and have two types of crystal formation: Macro crystalline quartz and Cryptocrystalline Quartz. Carnelian is Cryptocrystalline Quartz which a number of other gemstones belong to such as Agate, Onyx and Jasper Carnelian. Though often a solid colour, in some cases it may be banded. When you find a piece of banded Carnelian you could classify it as both Agate and Carnelian. Sometimes the brownish stone is called Sard. Carnelian is also sometimes known as 'Cornelian'. It is thought to be names after the Cornel Cherry.

Carnelian is sometimes confused with Jasper. One difference between them is if you hold them up to the light, Carnelian will be translucent and Jasper will be opaque. Jasper usually has multi coloured patterns or splotches on it whereas Carnelian us usually one colour with some darker or lighter areas.

Carnelian is used for jewellery, most commonly made into cabochons or carved. Carnelian cabochons were often referred to as 'Carbuncles'. Carnelian was also used in Roman times to make a seal or signet ring. Sealing wax does not stick to the Carnelian, so it was an ideal stone to use.

Carnelian gains it's colour from iron oxide forming impurities in the stone. Some stones in their the natural condition are of a dirty yellow colour and unsuitable for gems. When they are being heated, they develop the traditional Carnelian colour which makes them n

they are being heated, they develop the traditional Carnelian colour which makes them much more valuable.

It is considered to improve analytic abilities and clarify perception, sharpening concentration and dispelling mental lethargy. It also is said to help protect against strong negative emotions such as envy, rage and resentment, calming anger and banishing emotional negativity. Replacing it with a love of life and boosting fertility sexuality.

Crystal healers use Carnelian to treat lower back problems, rheumatism, arthritis, neuralgia and depression. They also use it to regulate the kidneys, and accelerate the healing process in bones and ligaments.

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Brad Smith's Bench Tips

Soldering Prongs

I often use prongs to hold an irregular cab or other object on rings and pendants. But prongs can be a little tricky to solder. You have to find some way to hold them all upright while soldering, and the simple butt joint that looks strong sometimes breaks when you start to bend the prong over the stone. There's nothing worse than having a prong break off when you're setting the stone *#~*! I solved both problems with one little trick. It holds the prongs in position while soldering and it gives you a stronger joint at the same time. Locate and center punch the position for each prong. Then drill holes a little smaller than your prong wire. Sand a small taper on the ends of your



prong wires and stand them up in the holes. The wires support themselves, soldering is easy, and the joint is stronger because of the increased soldering area.

Twisting Wire

Twisting wire can be done with an old hand drill but goes much faster with a power tool. My preference is to use a screw gun, although Foredom should do well. Just make a little hook out of coat hanger wire (or use a screw-in cup hook) and chuck it up in your screw gun. Grip the free ends of the wire in a vice and slip the looped end onto your hook. Keep a little tension on the wires as you twist. Note that a power drill is too fast a tool for this unless you have one with variable speed.

June Workshop Report

This month we learnt how to make a copper cuff bracelet using the rolling mill.

The rolling mill is a wonderful machine for imprinting a texture onto metal. You can use lace, mesh, cardboard, feathers, leaves or any dry object that can be squeezed between two rollers.

Before you get to do the fun stuff, you have to prepare your copper. We cut, shaped, filed and then sanded the strip of copper until we were happy with its edges and surface.

We then annealed it using a gas soldering torch. When you heat the metal up it softens it, making it malleable. Once the metal has been through the rolling mill it becomes hard again. So if you want to do further work on it, you have to anneal it.
