Alexandrite

Alexandrite is an alternative birthstone for June. Pearl is the more commonly known birthstone for June.

Alexandrite is a very rare and relatively new gemstone. It was discovered in April 1934, the day the Tsar Alexander came or age. It was found in the Emerald mines near the Tokovaya river in the Urals. As it is found in both red and green it became the national stone of imperial Russia.

Due to its rarity it is not used much in modern jewellery, but it can be found in Antique jewellery and some Victorian English jewellery.

One of the most special features of this stone is that it changes colour when seen in different lights. It is green or bluish-green in daylight and then turns a soft shade of red, purplish-red or raspberry red in artificial light.



Alexandrite is a metamorphic stone which is basically Chrysoberyl, which is a mineral consisting of colourless or yellow transparent Chrysoberyl, It is different to other Chrysoberyls because it contains iron and titanium as well as chromium, which is a major impurity. The Chromium is the reason you get the colour change. Very occasionally vanadium may also be present.

Initially it was found in Russia, but after the Russian sources were depleted, discoveries were made in Brazil. The Brazilian stones are not as strong a green as the Russian stones, but they still have the colour changing ability. For Chrysoberyl to be called Alexandrite, it must change colour. Chatoyancy (A concentrated narrow band of reflected light across the centre of the stone, as often seen in Cat's Eye) has been found in some of the Brazilian stones

Brad Smith's Bench Tips

SMALL PARTS CONTAINERS

I'm always on the lookout for small containers to use for holding all those little parts and tools we deal with in making jewelry, especially since I'm always traveling to classes and workshops.

My latest find are some plastic vials about 15 mm in diameter and 75 mm long. Best part is they are free. The vials are used in the doctor's office to draw blood samples. They cannot be used after their expiration date, and are thrown out. On my last doctors visit, I asked the nurse if the had any expired vials. She replied "How many do you want?" and tried to give me 400 of them. (We settled on 200). The ones I have are called "Vacutainers", but there are probably many other names. They are clear plastic with a rubber stopper and a paper label all ready to write on. I find them really handy for small parts like jump rings, prong settings, small drills, nuts & bolts, faceted stones, and precious metal filings.

TRY A TOOTHPICK

The round, stronger toothpicks have a multitude of uses on the jewelry bench. I use them for mixing epoxy resin, for applying paste solder, and with Zam for polishing in tight spots. Toothpicks are also handy for holding the stone while stone setting. Just break off the sharp tip, mold a little beeswax over it, and press it onto the table of your stone.
