Moonstone

Moonstone is composed of alternate layers of orthoclase feldspar and a variety of plagioclase albite and sheet mica, which makes it look like it is glowing from within. It ranges from transparent to opaque. It is called a moonstone because it has a bluish white shimmer that reminds people of the moon. This shimmering effect is called adularescence.

Adularescence is a result of moonstone's unique structural pattern. It contains very small inclusions of albite, which is a sodium aluminium silicate, intermixed with layers of orthoclase, a potassium aluminium silicate. The alternating layers of different feldspars form a lamellar (scaly) structure which causes the interference of light as it enters the stone. Thin layers of alternating silicates refract more attractive and colourful sheens than thicker layers. As light enters the stone, it is refracted and scattered, producing an extremely unique and attractive play of both colour and light. With moonstone, the aura of light actually appears to glow from deep within the surface of the stone.

Labradorite has a similar effect, though not quite as impressive. Labradorite is actually plagioclase (Plagioclase is a series of tectosilicate minerals within the feldspar family) feldspar, whereas moonstone is by composition a potassium feldspar.

Some moonstones can exhibit 'chatoyancy' (the ability to change colour like a cat's eye). These are known as 'cat's eye moonstone'. Other rare varieties of moonstone can occur with 'asterism' effects. These are known as 'star moonstone'. Cat's eye and star moonstones are exceptionally rare and highly prized.

Moonstone is usually colourless, but it can be found in a wide range of colours such as including gray, brown, yellow, orange, green, pink, blue and white. The most common colour is most a white to bluish-white sheen, but other sheens can occur such as silvery and blue-orange.

Moonstone can be found in a number of countries usually where there are granite and feldspar rich granite deposits and syenitic pegmatites. The biggest moonstone deposits are from Sri Lanka and India.

Moonstone is most commonly made into an oval cabochon. This best shows off the qualities of the stone.

Physically moonstone is used in crystal healing to aid the pituitary gland and digestive system, obesity, water retention, hormonal problems, menstrual problems.

Brad Smith's Bench Tips

SMOOTHING EARWIRES

Any time you make your own ear wires, the hardest part for me is to sand and polish the end that's inserted into the ear. Any sharp edge there is no fun. I've tried using sanding sticks, cup burs, and silicone polishing wheels. I've tried buffing on a Zam wheel, and I've tried spinning the wire in the Foredom to polish the tip. While all of these techniques do the job, none are very easy, and none are as fast as I'd like. Then it occurred to me - I could melt the wire smooth. One quick touch in the flame of propane/oxygen Little Torch does the trick - not enough to form a bead on the wire but just enough to rou

One quick touch in the flame of the propane/oxygen Little Torch does the trick - not enough to form a bead on the wire but just enough to round off the tip. I find it's worth practicing the maneuver a couple times on some scrap wire before trying it on completed earrings.

BALL BURS

I use ball burs quite a bit for carving and for cleaning up bits of solder that need to be removed. The ball shape seems to be more controllable than other cutting burs. They're less apt to grab and walk over your piece. As to sizes I've found that 8 mm is a very useful size for carving while a half mm or smaller at high speed works great for signing your name on the back of your work.

Looking after the club

This is just a reminder to all club members that we need to look after our equipment. It is very expensive and if it is damaged or broken, everyone is affected.

Wheels

Our 100 grit wheel is still being damaged by a someone who doesn't **move** their stone from one side of the wheel to the other. If you leave your stone in one place it will wear a groove in the middle of the wheel, this makes it impossible to do some types of shaping.

Trim Saws

The trim saws are only to be used to trim slabs. One blade has been worn out and the other one is just about gone. If you cut large pieces of rock on the trim saw you will wear the diamond off the blade, then they can't cut anything. If you press the rock hard into the blade, the same thing will happen. Be gentle and let the saw do the work (don't push it) and only trim cut slabs. Its name says it all "Trim Saw".

Clean up

When you have finished working on a machine, clean it up. The floor may need mopping as well as the machines do splash. Remember, your mum doesn't work here!
