Stone of the Month - Amber

Amber is the hardened resin of ancient pine trees. It is an organic gemstone. The hardening process of Amber is known as polymerization, which fossilizes the resin over many centuries and makes it hard and sturdy. Amber is formed from viscous, sticky resin and therefore commonly contains inclusions that got stuck in the Amber and remained there when it hardened. These inclusions are usually of insects or plants, with the most well-known being mosquitoes. Amber with well-preserved organisms frozen internally is highly prized.





People have been making jewellery from amber for over 10,000 years. Amber's most common colours are yellow, orange, and brown in various shades. Pieces with green, blue, or violet tints due to extreme fluorescence are rare. A blue-colour Amber is found in the Dominican Republic. The blue tinge to it caused by fluorescence, but when observed directly through strong light it will have a more typical orange-yellow colour. Dominican Amber is strongly fluorescent, both in longwave and shortwave

Amber also has a wide range of transparency. The transparent material is used almost exclusively for jewellery. Amber is often used for beads, pendants, earrings, and rings. The cloudiness in Amber is usually caused by trapped air bubbles, which are very small and dense. The more opaque material is frequently carved into artistic ornaments and inlays and practical objects such as pipe stems and umbrella handles. Amber is also burned as incense and used as an ingredient in perfumes

Amber has a very low specific gravity, and is one of the lightest of gemstones. Baltic Amber is sometimes found with sand on the beach, especially after storms.

Amber is very soft for a gemstone, and is not very durable. Its hardness on Moh's scale is 2 - 2.5. Aside from its tendency to easily scratch, it is adversely affected by chemicals and solutions, and should be kept away from alcohol, perfume, gasoline, acids, or any solvents. Amber will also burn if exposed to fire, and can crack under too much heat or pressure.

Types of Amber

Amberoid: Synonym of Pressed Amber

Baltic Amber: Amber from the vicinity of the Baltic Sea, mainly near the coastline of Latvia, Lithuania, Russia (in Kaliningrad Oblast - an isolated Russian Province in the Baltics), and northern Poland. The world's largest Amber reserves exist in this area. **Blue Amber:** Rare form of Amber from the Dominican Republic (Dominican Amber) with a characteristic blue and yellow colour that changes to all yellow when viewed directly into light.

Bony Amber: Cloudy, translucent Amber containing dense inclusions of bubbles throughout its interior.

Burmite: Amber originating from Burma (Myanmar).

Copal: Hardened resin that has partially gone through the polymerization process to harden it, but is not fully polymerized like Amber.

Dominican Amber: Amber from the Dominican Republic.

Pressed Amber: Larger pieces of Amber created by compressing resin pieces or small Amber fragments into a single mass at high temperatures.

Simetite: Amber from the island of Sicily, Italy.

Brad Smith's Bench Tips

BEZEL PROBLEMS

When bezel setting a cab that has rather sharp corners, have you ever had problems pushing the metal down at the corners? It's a common problem often causing a wrinkle in your bezel and a grimace on your face.

In order for a bezel to capture the stone, the top edge of the bezel must be compressed and become shorter to lay down onto the stone. With a round or oval stone this naturally happens as you push and burnish the bezel. But when setting a stone with corners, the tendency is to



push the long sides of the bezel down first. No compression occurs along the sides, and all excess metal is left at the corners. Compressing everything there is difficult. Often the only way to remove the extra metal at the corner is to make a saw cut and fold the two sides in to touch.

If you want a smooth bezel all around the corners, the simple solution is to set the corners of the bezel first. Then push in and burnish the sides. In this way the necessary compression is distributed along the length of all sides and not forced to occur at the corners. With the corners set first, the top edge of the bezel can easily be compressed along the sides.



CHEAPER & BETTER PICKLE

Most jewelers use a granular pickle mixed with water. The active ingredient is sodium bisulfate. This can be purchased from local stores as a common pool chemical used for adjusting the acidity of the water. It's sold under various names, so be sure to check the list of active ingredients for a brand that is 95% or more sodium bisulfate.

An added benefit is that the pool chemical is more pure in form than what is sold for jewelry use and does not cause the brown grime often found floating on the top of the pot.
