#### Dictionary. The Lapidary Difference.

WORD / SAYING	FIELD	MEANING	
ANNEALING	Dichroic Glass	Glass is strengthen by reducing heat of kiln slowly	
ANNEALING	Silver	Metal is tempered with heat to allow easier manipulation & reduce stress	
BURNISHER	Silver	Used to smooth metal in polishing process	
CENTRIFUGE	Silver LWC	Rotates at high speed to force melted metal into lost wax space	
CONGLOMERATE	Lapidary	A mixture of stones formed into one	
COUNTER ENAMEL	Enamelling	Enamels contaminated when colours mix together accidentally.	
CRINOIDEA	Fossil	A fossilized echinoderm eg sea lily & feather stars	
CROWN	Faceting	The raised area of a brilliant cut gemstone	
CULET	Faceting	The bottom point of a brilliant cut gemstone	
DIVIDER	Silver	For measuring & scoring metal & wax	
DOUBLETS	Opal	A thin piece of Opal usually backed with a piece of black potch eg 2 layers	
ENAMELLING	Enamelling	Permanent Colour designs can be formed with glass powder on metal	
FACETING	Faceting	Cutting a gemstone at many angles to allow light dispersion & refraction	
FINE SILVER	Silver	99.9% Silver	
FLUX	Silver	An agent to help solder flow, the most common is borax	
GIRDLE	Faceting	The middle rim of a brilliant cut gemstone	
INDEX GEAR	Faceting	Numbered teeth used to set the facet angle. Our machines have 96 teeth	
INVESTMENT	Silver LWC	A powder mix that forms a paste when mixed with water & encases wax	
JEWELLERS SAW	Silver	An adjustable saw used by Jewellers. It uses very fine blades	
LOST WAX CASTING (LWC)	Silver LWC	A wax mould is formed & used to turn the wax into a metal image	
MANDREL	Silver	Steel shapes used for shaping or stretching metal jewellery pieces	
MOHS SCALE	Lapidary	A scale to calculate the hardness of stones, Talc 1, Diamond 10	
NEEDLE FILES	Silver	A Set of small assorted shaped files used to shape metal & wax	
NUTS	Lapidary	An egg or walnut shape rock encasing minerals such as Opal or quartz	
ORANGE PEEL EFFECT	Enamelling	Rough & uneven enamel is usually from under firing	
PAVILION	Faceting	The Lower section of a brilliant cut gemstone	
PICKLING COMPOUND	Silver	A chemical solution that removes oxides that formed as the result of heating	
POTCH	Lapidary	Common Opal form usually white and/or Grey without brilliant colours	
PRECIOUS METAL CLAY (PMC)	Silver	Fine silver combined with an organic "clay" that burns away when fired	
PRECIOUS OPAL	Lapidary	A brilliant multi coloured form of silica mostly found in Australia.	
SCRIBER	Silver	For scoring or marking designs on silver work. Also used for stone carving	
SGRAFFITO	Enamelling	Use contrasting colours & use different shape tools to form patterns	
SOLDER	Silver	An alloy that fuses metal together when heated.	
SPRUE	Silver LWC	Is used to "glue" a shape onto a mould base to hold items together	
STEEL SHOT	Silver LWC	Stainless steel balls used in a vibrator with water to clean & polish metal	
STERLING SILVER	Silver	92.5% Silver & 7.5% Copper	
SWIRLING	Enamelling	Swirl hot enamel while still in kiln to make individual designs	
TABLE	Faceting	The flat top of a brilliant cut gemstone	
TRANSFER JIG	Faceting	A metal jig used to transfer gemstone from one side to the other for cutting	
TREE / BUTTON	Silver LWC	Wax trees & buttons hold shapes in place & convert to silver when cast	
TRIPETS	Opal	A thin piece of backed Opal with a clear dome glued to top eg 3 layers	
V BOARD (PEG)	Silver	A small piece of V shaped timber clamped to workbench	
VULCANIZER	Silver LWC	Is used to make rubber moulds which are used to make wax moulds	
WET CHARGING	Enamelling	Enamel can be used as a paste & detailed designs can then be formed	
WINDLASS	Lapidary	A structure set on top of a mine hole for raising rocks & other weights

#### **Amethyst**

Amethyst is the purple variety of the quartz mineral species. It's the gem that's most commonly associated with the colour purple, even though there are other purple gems such as sapphire and tanzanite. Its purple colour can be cool and bluish, or a reddish purple that's sometimes referred to as "raspberry."



Amethyst is a 7 on the Mohs scale of hardness. This means that it is appropriate for daily use in rings and other jewellery, but over time it may show wear and require repolishing. Because this February birthstone is more susceptible to damage than harder gems such as rubies, sapphires and diamonds, you risk scratching your amethyst jewellery if you place it next to these harder stones...

Heat treatment is the most common technique for improving the colour and marketability of natural amethyst. Heat treatment can't make pale amethyst darker, but it can lighten the colour of very dark amethyst and make it more attractive. It can also remove unwanted brownish inclusions in some amethysts. Some amethyst turns yellow – to citrine – with heat treatment.

Heat treating amethyst results in a permanent change in colour. However, submitting it to intense heat may render it slightly more brittle than usual, and care must be taken not to damage pointed faceted corners and sharp edges. Note, too, that excessive heat can remove the colour entirely, and some amethyst fades with prolonged exposure to strong light. Though the colour is stable with normal use, this is not a birthstone to wear to the beach every day.

Amethyst birthstone jewellery can be cleaned with an ultrasonic cleaner, but steam cleaning is not recommended. A soft brush with mild soap is the safest option.

Fine amethysts have been set in religious jewellery and royal crown jewels for ages. It was once considered equal in value to ruby, emerald, and sapphire. It's no wonder that fine amethyst adorns the fingers of bishops as well as the coronation regalia of British royalty.

The name "amethyst" derives from the Greek amethystos, which means "a remedy against drunkenness," a benefit long ascribed to the purple birthstone. Because of its wine-like colour, early Greek mythology associated the gem with Bacchus, the god of wine. Amethyst was also believed to keep the wearer clear headed and quick witted in battle and business affairs. Renaissance Europeans thought it calmed lovers overrun by passion.

Amethyst's purple colour can range from a light lilac to a deep, intense royal purple, and from brownish to vivid. Amethyst also commonly shows what is called colour zoning, which in the case of amethyst usually consists of angular zones of darker to lighter colour
