
Exhibition

Due to the lockdown, we have had to cancel the exhibition. Lockdown doesn't finish until midnight of the day we were going to be setting up. On Monday, we received an email from the council saying that they have cancelled our booking for the Greg Percival Community Centre. They have cancelled all bookings for the venue and will not be even looking at new bookings until after September.

This is such a huge disappointment for us. So much work has already gone into the preparation for this event. I would personally like to thank everyone who has been involved in preparing for the exhibition, there are so many jobs that need to be done to prepare for an event this size such as the club stall, cleaning and prepping display cases. publicity, sorting out equipment and many other tasks. In particular, I would like to thank Margaret for the incredible amount of work she has done to get the exhibition to this stage, only to have it cancelled with the weekend lockdown. Margaret now has the task of contacting all the dealers and telling them the bad news. Publicity also has to be taken down and cancellation notices published. For all our wonderful helpers who took posters and flyers, if you have put them out somewhere, please collect them as we don't want disappointed people turning up at the door.

Club Equipment 400 Wheel

I feel like I am always having to say this, but if you are using the club's equipment, please take care of it. If you notice a problem let us know. At the start of Saturday we noticed the hard 400 wheel had been damaged. It had two chunks



taken out of it. This is not something that would happen and not be noticed. It looks like something very sharp or hard has punctured the wheel. If something happens to the equipment, report it to the duty officer at once.

Trim Saw

The second piece of destroyed equipment was the blade for the trim saw. It had only been replaced the week before. It looks like someone has forced a slab through it. When you use a trim saw, you let the blade take the stone, you don't force it into it to make it cut quicker. A gentle touch is required to get the best life out of the blade. This has been happening on a regular basis, so if you are using the trim saw, have a light hand and don't push the stone hard into the blade.

Flat Laps

Some exciting news, I was very excited to try out the new flat laps. John and his team have been working on this project for quite a while. It is brilliant. I have been wanting to use this machine since I joined



the club in 2010. At the moment we have a 100 grit and a 220 grit disc for it, but as it has been successful, the club will be purchasing more discs.

If you want to use the flat laps, see the duty officer and they will show you how to use them. The discs are delicate, they must be used with water and when being removed, care must be taken. Once they are finished being used, they need to be washed and dried and given to the duty officer to put them safely away.

Gem and Lapidary Council

I had the miserable job of contacting the Gem and Lapidary Council to ask them to take down our advertisement for the Exhibition. 

Recipe of the Month

Found this recipe in an old *Rockgrinders Gazette* – not sure who contributed it, but it sounded interesting and appropriate, given that lockdown and a glut of citrus this season has given us the perfect opportunity to try something different. Hope you find it tasty.

Egg-less Lemon Spread (makes 11/4 cups)

½ cup milk

1/4 cup water

1 tbsp corn flour

6 tbsp sugar

6 tbsp fresh lemon juice

1 teaspoon lemon zest

5 tbsp unsalted butter

pinch of salt

optional: 1/4 teaspoon lemon extract

Directions:

- Dissolve the corn flour in the cold milk and water
- 2. Turn heat to medium-high and continuously stir the mixture.
- 3. Add in the butter, lemon juice and sugar and continue to stir until mixture starts to bubble and thicken.
- 4. Reduce heat to low and beat with a hand-held beater for about 90 seconds.
- 5. Transfer mixture to sterile jar, seal, & refrigerate when chilled.
- 6. Store in fridge and use within 2-3 weeks



July Birthdays - Ruby

Ruby

Ruby is the July birthstone – and it's one of the most coveted of gems. The name is derived from the Latin word "ruber", meaning "red" – the colour of love and passion. Few things catch the eye like the ruby birthstone. The finest colour of the birthstone for July is a deep red with a hint of purple, called "pigeon's blood" in the trade. A variety of the mineral corundum, ruby gets its colour from trace amounts of the element chromium. The more chromium, the stronger the red.




JULY RUBY

In ancient India, ruby was called the "king of precious stones" for its rarity, hardness (second only to diamond), beauty and seemingly mystical powers. Long associated with the life force blood, ruby was a symbol of power and youthful energy in Indian jewellery. In past centuries, some believed this birthstone for July could predict misfortune or danger, and others claimed it would cure inflammatory diseases and soothe anger. Burmese warriors believed it made them invincible in battle. Medieval Europeans maintained that rubies bestowed health, wisdom, wealth and success in love.

Rubies are often heat treated to remove purplish coloration, leaving a purer red. The process can also remove "silk" (minute needle-like inclusions) that can cause a gem to appear lighter in tone and be more opaque. The trade typically accepts heat treatment, as it is stable to normal conditions of wear and care. However, rubies may also be subjected to lattice diffusion treatment and dyeing. In lower-quality material, surface-reaching fractures and cavities may be filled with a glass to decrease their visibility so the gem appears more transparent. Some of these treatments may make the ruby more vulnerable to damage during normal wear and care.

Before you buy, always ask if your ruby has been treated and by what method. The Federal Trade Commission requires disclosure of treatments that affect a gemstone's perceived value. A GIA Identification Report is important in identifying if a stone is natural or synthetic and whether it has been treated in any fashion.

In most cases, the July birthstone can be safely cleaned with warm soapy water and a soft brush. Ultrasonic and steam cleaners are usually safe for untreated, heat-treated and lattice diffusion—treated stones. Glass-filled or dyed stones should only be cleaned with a damp cloth. https://www.gia.edu/birthstones/july-birthstones#birthstone_2
