As such, all members are encouraged to attend the next General Meeting, on 3 December 2022.


Reminder - Open Day/Crystal Market Day - Now On 10 December

Turquoise

Believed to be a balancing stone, a protective stone, and a love charm, turquoise has a history as unique and interesting as the stone itself! December's birthstone, turquoise, is one of the most ancient gemstones known to

Turquoise is an opaque stone that ranges in colour from the bright blue of its name to green. It typically has a veined appearance, which is created by the remnants of the rock in which it formed. These veins can range from black to silver, tan, and even gold shades.



Among geologists, turquoise is referred to as "copper aluminum phosphate." It's most often found near water tables in semiarid and arid regions where rock contains copper-bearing minerals. Turquoise forms when chemicals leach out of surrounding rock via rain and groundwater to create these blue and green crystals. In fact, it is copper that gives turquoise its famed sky blue shade. Iron is what gives green turquoise its colour.

Of all stones, December birthstone turquoise has a particularly long history. In fact, it is one of the earliest stones known to be used in jewellery. The Aztecs believed it sacred, using it to make masks and other ceremonial objects, and Native Americans from many other cultures have used this stone in jewellery and ornamental pieces for thousands of years. One Native American name for turquoise is chal-cui-hui-tal, which means "the highest and most valued thing in the world."

Turquoise was most widely used among American Southwestern groups including the Zuni, Hopi, Pueblo, and Navajo Indians. Among these cultures, blue turquoise represented the heavens while green represented the earth. Medicine men would use these stones to make charms, and the Navajo thought that tossing turquoise into a river while praying to the rain god would bring rain.

In ancient Egypt, pharaohs and rulers used turquoise in jewellery. One tomb excavated in 1900 revealed the remains of Queen Zer, a ruler from 5500 B.C.E. She was wearing four turquoise bracelets. Beads dating to 5000 B.C.E. have been found in Mesopotamia (today's Iraq), and turquoise decorates King Tut's mask, which is more than 3,000 years old. Persians regarded turquoise as the national gemstone, using it to decorate their thrones, weapons, horse tack, cups and bowls, and more, and from China, there are turquoise carvings dating back more than 3,000 years.

Royals in more modern times have used turquoise, too. The Duchess of Windsor, Wallace Simpson (1896-1986), who King Edward VIII famously gave up his throne for, wore a turquoise and amethyst Cartier necklace. (Pictured at right)

And what about the name? Historians aren't entirely sure how "turquoise" came to be the name of this stone, but some think it may come from the French *pierre turquoise*, which translates to "Turkish stone." This idea stems from the fact that turquoise came to Europe via Venetian merchants who bought it at Turkish bazaars. Internet source

Turquoise is a porous gem with a 5 to 6 on the Mohs hardness scale. Thus, this December birthstone can be treated with resin or acrylic epoxy. This treatment improves turquoise's strength and colour. Turquoise can also be treated with a metal-loaded epoxy to fill any cracks. This process creates an effect similar to turquoise's marbling.



Turquoise is typically not affected by light. However, the gemstone can discolour when repeatedly exposed to high heat. Clean your stone only with warm water and gentle soap. This will allow you to enjoy your turquoise jewellery for many years to come. Internet source

Tips and Tricks

What is the Moh's Scale? Source - Working Silver

To put it in very basic terms, the Mohs scale of hardness is a relative scale of "scratchability." Basically the higher the number on the scale the harder the stone. A stone rated at an 8 can be scratched or damaged by a stone rated at a 9, but not one rated at a 7.

So all of this information is great, but how helpful is it really? What on earth is corundum? or Feldspar? These are the names given to certain groups of stones. Sapphires and Rubies are both part of the Corundum family of stones.

This scale is very helpful in determining how much abuse a gem can take. There are sometimes special exceptions, but as a general rule gemstones of a hardness of 8.0 or higher are considered to be durable. Intermediate stones are over 6.0 and up to 8.0, softer and more delicate stones are 6.0 and under. Gems that are 6.0 and under should be handled and cleaned with more care, and not exposed to chemicals or solvents.

One exception to the rule is the Emerald. Although it's tough at 7.5 - 8.0, it should be treated with some care. There are almost no perfect Emeralds found, they have numerous inclusions (flaws), so their resistance to breaking is lower than what its hardness level would imply.

No matter how hard a stone may be on the chart, the quality of the stone also determines its hardness. For example, a flawed diamond will be softer and more brittle than one that is absolutely perfect. The same is true for all other stones and organic gems as well.

Below are some of the most common stones and gems used in jewellery making with their hardness. As a general rule of thumb if you are putting jewellery with gemstones in a tumbler for a final polish, use caution and avoid stones below a 7 or 8 as well as any stones with visible inclusions or cracks. Generally, any stones below a 7 need extra care when setting as the steel tools used to set the stones can accidentally scratch or break the stone.

Your fingernail rates at a 2.5 on the scale, a solid copper penny is a 3.5, a glass plate or pen knife is a 5.5, while a steel nail is a 6.5 and a masonry drill bit is an 8.5.
